#### (1) CALL TO ORDER

The hybrid, in-person and virtual NWARPC/Policy Committee meeting was called to order by Chair, Judge Barry Moehring at 1:30 p.m.

### (2) ROLL CALL OF MEMBERS

In-person attendees introduced themselves and Tim Conklin named the virtual attendees. Nicole Gibbs recorded member names and tallied votes. A quorum was reached.

### (3) APPROVAL OF JUNE 28, 2023 RPC/POLICY COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

Chair Judge Moehring asked whether there were any additions or corrections to the meeting minutes and hearing none, requested a motion to approve the June 28, 2023 RPC/Policy Committee Meeting Minutes.

<u>MOTION</u>: Mayor Doug Sprouse made a motion to approve the June 28, 2023 RPC/Policy Committee Meeting Minutes as presented. Mayor John Flinn provided the second. Motion passed unanimously.

### (4) DIRECTOR'S REPORT/CLEARINGHOUSE REPORT

Chair Judge Moehring introduced the item and Tim Conklin said we were not successful in our application for the \$25 million RAISE grant for Highway 112: Complete Streets. Connected Communities. He said later on in the agenda is an item to authorize us to file Highway 112 for a Multimodal Project Discretionary Grant (MPDG). He said USDOT designated the Highway 112 RAISE grant project as a Project of Merit and encouraged us to apply for future rounds of USDOT funding. He said they also gave us priority debriefing and we have applied for that debriefing.

Conklin said this past week, NWARPC was notified of the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Areas of Persistent Poverty (AoPP) grant in the amount of \$180,000. He said the Commission originally applied for \$540,000 and Ozark Regional Transit (ORT) and Razorback Transit will be matching that federal award. He said we are excited to help move forward the implementation of the Bus Stop Enhancement Plan.

Conklin thanked everyone involved in helping get the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (CSAP) and Vision Zero Policy adopted by this Board last month. He said that plan enabled three cities in our region to apply for \$70 million of potential SS4A Implementation Grants. He said together we are all working non-stop to make sure we meet future grant requirements by having the required plans adopted and in place.

Conklin said we received approximately \$20 million in requests for Surface Transportation Block Grant Program – Attributable (STBGP-A), Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP), and Carbon Reduction Program (CRP).

Conklin said the Clearinghouse Report was distributed to the Board and no action is required.

### A. Procurement for Certified Public Accountant (CPA) – Auditor Selection

Conklin said we received one letter of interest for our audit procurement for CPA services for Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 (July 1, 2022 – June 30, 2023). He said our policy does allow us to move forward with one response and we are just bringing this to your attention. He said he did discuss this with Treasurer, Mayor Chris Keeney, and he agreed that we should move forward with the firm that provided the letter of interest. Conklin said this is the same firm that completed the FY 2022 audit last year. He asked if there were any objections to using the same auditor as last year and there were none. He said staff would like to begin negotiations and bring an agreement and feedback to the Board in August.

### B. 2024 Membership Fee Request

Conklin said we do not discuss raising membership fees often, maybe once every five to ten years. He said we have been preparing for an increase in federal funds, not only for our program, but also for the suballocated funding that is awarded to our member jurisdictions. He said as part of the Board packet sent last week and based on our anticipated fiscal year budget for FY 2025 (starting July 1, 2024), he is requesting the Board consider raising the membership dues from 70 cents per capita to 85 cents per capita based on the 2020 census population data for the 10 member jurisdictions that have full time planning staffs. He said the remaining 25 smaller jurisdictions currently pay \$1 per capita and would remain at that rate.

Conklin said the 2020 Census Urban Area population increased by 87,604 to 373,687 and additional federal funding will come to NWARPC (approximately \$126,000). He said additional local matching requirements will start in FY 2025 (i.e. July 1, 2024). He said this discussion is necessary now because your local budgets for 2024 must be approved prior to the end of this year, so bringing this up for discussion after the first of the year will be too late.

Conklin said the NWARPC FY 2024 adopted Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) budget (July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2024) required approximately \$400,000 of non-federal funding sources to match approximately \$1.6 million in federal funding. He said membership dues currently provide \$398,430 of non-federal local matching funds leaving little funding for non-transportation related activities to be conducted. He also acknowledged and expressed gratitude for the other local sources utilized, including Walton Family Foundation grants for various projects. He said the Commission must be able to match federal funds, which are restricted to transportation purposes, and still have funds available for other regional planning activities. He said if dues are not raised, we will need to match federal funds that we program next year to ensure that we have enough local funds to match federal dollars and also to enable activities outside of transportation planning. He gave examples of current non-transportation related activities.

Conklin said as a matter of comparison with other MPO's designated as Transportation Management Areas (TMAs) in Arkansas with regional planning commissions, Metroplan members in Central Arkansas currently pay a minimum of 92 cents per capita per year. He said, also as a matter of comparison, it should be noted that our fee structure in 1996 was 85 cents/capita/year.

Conklin said we typically send our annual budget requests out in early August for you all to consider in your budgets. He said as you know, the approval of membership fees rests with the governing

bodies of member governments and as such, unless there are objections, he would like to proceed with 2024 budget requests of 85 cents/capita/year for members with professional planning staff (up from 70 cents); and continue with a \$1/capita/year for the remaining members.

Conklin said Washington County indicated that they were not prepared to vote today, and Mayor Orman had questions that he responded to yesterday regarding how many services outside of transportation are provided to Bentonville. He said larger cities have more capacity; we often spend more time with smaller cities, and they are still paying a higher rate per capita. He said overall we hope that everybody is brought up to a level of comprehensive planning, zoning, subdivision, annexation, etc. that benefits the entire region. He said he does understand that larger cities do not have as much non-transportation attention as do the smaller cities.

There was discussion regarding how resources are allocated to provide planning services to communities; the trends of requests with the level of growth in the region; the alternating nature and scalability of those services to jurisdictions over time; the capacity of the organization to serve increasing numbers of requests and fill many needs; the many different initiatives being discussed at public meetings and the increasing requests coming to NWARPC to facilitate those initiatives at the regional level.

There was discussion regarding the federal mandate to do transportation planning in order for the region to be eligible for federal funding; the benefit to larger cities including the greater allocation of federal aid transportation projects; the benefit of regional consistency in land use planning; the return on investment of the collective dues, including planning services provided to smaller cities; the benefit to the citizens of NWA; and the benefit to having more flexibility to branch out into other regional initiatives.

There was discussion regarding the interconnectivity of transportation, housing, land use, stormwater, energy and environment, etc.; and the possibility of the region becoming a Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement (CMAQ) nonattainment or maintenance area in the near future, after which, the MPO will have additional responsibilities.

A request was made to review the organizing bylaws to ensure those services are within the scope of the organization. There was discussion regarding the correlation with regional planning goals and the services being offered; the scope of services being to assist all communities to assume best management practices throughout the region and making improvements to local codes and programming so that we are not having to inefficiently allocate federal dollars to correct issues that have occurred over the years (e.g. sidewalk standards, subdivision standards; stormwater standards, etc.).

There was discussion regarding considerations given for other funding structures; the reality that costs have gone up with inflation and everyone is paying more for the same service than in the past; the significance of the proposed vote including potential scenarios if governing bodies do not approve the budget request; and the stipulation that you need to be a member to be awarded NWARPC federal funds.

A concern was raised regarding whether the whole Board would vote to raise a specific subset of the Board's fee structure.

A request was made to provide a letter to affected communities that they can bring to their governing bodies and budget team that explains the issues, what the change would represent in dollars, what the services to the communities include, or might include, and indicate that the Board will vote on the fee structure change in August.

Chair Judge Moehring asked whether there were any other questions or comments and there were none.

(5) FY 2023 MULTIMODAL PROJECT DISCRETIONARY GRANT (MPDG) HIGHWAY 612 SPRINGDALE NORTHERN BYPASS AND HIGHWAY 112: COMPLETE STREETS. CONNECTING COMMUNITIES. PROJECT AUTHORIZATION

Chair Judge Moehring introduced the item and Tim Conklin explained that we would like to submit Highway 112 and Highway 612 for the Multimodal Project Discretionary Grant (MPDG). He said we sent a letter to ARDOT requesting their support and match of those federal funds. He thanked Rob Smith and the NWA Council for their support in the preparation of the Benefit Cost Analyses, which are being completed for Highway 112 and Highway 612. He said we are looking at how to advance our regional priority transportation projects. He said we are seeking authorization to apply for those two grants.

(6) ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY (EPA) CLIMATE POLLUTION REDUCTION GRANT (CPRG) FOR NWA ENERGY & ENVIRONMENT INNOVATION ACTION PLANNING – Agreement with Arkansas Energy & Environment (AEE)

Chair Judge Moehring introduced the item and Elizabeth Bowen explained the Arkansas Department of Energy & Environment (ADEE) received a \$3 million EPA Climate Pollution Reduction Formula

Grant for Planning. She said we submitted a notice of intent to participate (NOIP). She said ADEE has invited us to partner with them on the Arkansas Energy and Environment Innovation Plan, which will enable our communities to apply for CPRG Implementation Grants, which are expected to be due April 1, 2024. She said the EPA is expected to award a total of \$4.6 billion nationwide in competitive implementation grants in this single funding cycle, with individual grants ranging from \$2 million to \$500 million. She said Arkansas Division of Environmental Quality (DEQ) is proposing to suballocate \$440,000 to NWARPC to complete planning for Greenhouse Gas (GHG), carbon reduction/sequestration in our region.

Bowen said we will utilize projects and recommendations in our current plans that we are implementing regionally to compile into an Action Plan for this project (e.g. the 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), NWA Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan, NWA Open Space Plan, NWA Vision Zero Plan, Connect NWA, Congestion Management Process, NWA Transportation Systems Management and Operations, NWA Intelligent Transportation System, and the STBGP-A, TAP, and CRP funding programs).

Bowen introduced Tricia Trecee, Deputy Associate Director of ADEQ, to present the project further. Treece detailed the EPA CPRG Planning Grants and Implementation Grants. She said you cannot apply for an implementation grant unless it is covered by a CPRG. She said ADEQ wants to enable access to and enhance Arkansas's competitiveness for federal funding for energy infrastructure and support investment in technologies that reduce pollutant emissions, create high-quality jobs, and spur economic growth in the state.

Treece said there are three primary deliverables:

- Priority Action Plan due March 1, 2024 (Implementation Grants due exactly one month later)
- Comprehensive Action Plan due two years from award (est. summer/fall 2025)
- Status Report due four years from award (est. summer/fall 2027)

Trecee said ADEQ reached out to Metroplan, NWARPC, and the City of Fort Smith because they submitted NOIPs, and together those three organizations account for half of the state's population. She said due to the tight timeline, the partnerships allow ADEQ to focus in the other areas of the state, while the three entities can cover their own regions. She said NWARPC knows better than we do regarding your priorities and goals and has closer relationships with local jurisdictions.

Trecee described proposed engagement, further details of the three deliverables, and next steps. She said the important thing they are thinking about for the Priority Plan is designing project concepts and model project designs so local government agencies can pull out the model projects from the plan and plug it into the grant applications.

Trecee said there is no local match requirement for these funds.

Bowen said we will be setting up a steering committee where you can designate staff to help us get this Action Plan together. She said we are working through an agreement with the state and she further outlined the deliverables within the draft agreement.

Bowen asked whether there were any questions or comments.

Chair Judge Moehring introduced the item and Nicole Gibbs said in the interest of time she would try to be brief and thanked the Board's staff who have been working closely with us over the last few weeks, helping us work toward the obligation deadline in September. She showed the 2023 awards and highlighted the projects that we anticipate meeting the obligation deadline. She said we need all projects to continue working towards obligation even if you are not represented in our obligation scenario.

Conklin said this is important because ARDOT must tell FHWA how much money they can obligate as a state. He said depending on how much they can obligate effects August redistribution, which allows additional federal funds to flow to each state. He said Missouri lost about \$130 million in one year, and \$180 million in another year. He said we told ARDOT we feel we can obligate \$9.5 million before the September 2023 deadline. He said these values go up and down and it is very important to work to obligate as much as possible every year.

Gibbs said we believe we have built in some flexibility, so as the moving pieces continue to move, we should be able to meet that goal. She said one moving piece is that some projects are currently inactive and must become active through the submittal of reimbursement requests. She said we have been working very closely with your staff and said thank you again to those who are working hard to get these projects in shape to obligate funds. She said ARDOT needs about four weeks to process the reimbursement requests, so it is important that they be submitted this week. She said please feel free to reach out with questions.

Bowen said NWARPC, Bentonville, Fayetteville, and Rogers have adopted Vision Zero Goals. She said Bentonville, Fayetteville, Rogers have applied for SS4A Implementation Grants.

Bowen said we had previously announced that since we had already adopted the Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (CSAP) prior to USDOT getting the agreement of understanding to us, that we may be able to complete supplemental planning and demonstration projects with that funding. She said we have since heard that USDOT plans to rescind the funds. She said we followed up stating that although we did adopt a plan, there were many aspects of our scope of work that were not completed, including:

- Individual Plans for "up to 6 of the largest cities if needed"
- Systemic Safety Webinars 2
- Video/Storytelling
- Safety Demonstration Projects
- Community engagement strategies
- Action Plan Communication Materials

She said USDOT responded that they would review and let us know if they will approve the use of the funds.
